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COMMODORE'S REPORT

Welcome to the Autumn Mainsheet Edition. Since our last Edition the Club has continued to focus on improving our Safety on and off the water as well as our commitment to continuous improvement of our Environmental Management of the Club's grounds and operations. Thanks to our Environment Officer, Stephanie Turner, we conducted a presentation to members on Sunday 24th March to inform members of our environmental responsibilities as well as providing practical guidance to members on how they can plan play their part. We also introduced our new Environmental Policy, which can be found in this publication. In our upcoming busy bees we will also focus on physically improving a number of environmental and safety matters surrounding the storage of fuel and paint as well as responsibly disposing of a number of old tyres.

As promised, at our Special General Meeting conducted in December last year where we adopted amendments to the Club's Constitution to meet new regulations, I am pleased to advise that we have formed a Constitution Sub-Committee, consisting of Peter Twiby, Juliann Lloyd-Smith, Ingrid Landwehr and Brian Wooller, to review the entire constitution and how it operates with associated documents such as the Club's By-Laws with the aim of providing the opportunity for all members to participate in creating a modern gender neutral document that will operate efficiently and effectively with the By-Laws. I thank the Sub-Committee in advance for their proactive initiative in establishing the committee and encourage all members to provide their valuable input into the review as well as attend member information sessions as and when they are held.

We have also received praise from Perth Flying Squadron and Claremont Yacht Club's where NYC Cruisers represented the majority of the fleets in their respective recent signature events. Not surprisingly NYC Cruisers took out many the podium positions in these events. Unfortunately we have had a number of on-water safety incidents, many of which involved power boats, most notable during the Hobie States. As a result of these incidents, we have written to WA Australian Sailing and Swan River Racing, where our concerns will be tabled at a Yacht Club level. We have requested Yacht Clubs that have power boat members provide training and education to their power boat members to inform them of mark locations on the river and likely locations on the river where yachts and catamarans will be congested or changing directions with the aim of providing power boats with the knowledge to avoid these locations and/or take more care and have patience when they come across sailing boats. No withstanding the above, I must remind all sailors to keep their heads out of the boat and always look under or around sails to avoid collisions and also be ready to ease sails to bear away behind another boat.

As highlighted above the Club continues to host great events such as the Hobie States, where many competitors and volunteers enjoyed camping on our grounds. Over the Easter Holidays NYC will again host the WA Schools Team Racing Event for the third year running, which is testament to our volunteers and event organisers and our Club being the best off the beach viewing Club on the Swan.

See you on the water.

HMAS Perth Memorial Regatta – this was a very smooth and well-run event this year. The use of the club line gave spectators a great view of the action, extending the club start line to cater for the bigger boats was a success. Thanks to the people who baked and brought down food, the ladies that volunteered inside and our canteen angels were as usual in excellent form. The functions/office organisation this year covered all bases, Lucy Bromell our Membership coordinator doing a sterling job with the formal invitations and background work to pull it all together on her first attempt.

Hobie States: the Hobie cat association last year requested the use of the club for their states over the March long weekend. Given the notice to the club it was a little tricky working around some weddings that had already booked out the club. With some coordination between Jacinta running the events and the Hobies teams involved it all worked out perfectly. Thanks to the NYC members and other press-ganged volunteers for helping run an excellent event. It was quite a sight having 32 Hobies on the beach and there are some excellent photo's around to prove it. Well done to Cam & Suz who dominated this year, second was Darren & Claire (despite a boat change and a 50 foot motor boats best efforts). Third was Phil & Caitlyn Epps from Geraldton. Great to see four boats in the top ten from regional WA, it shows how much Hobie talent is out there in WA.

Protest!! is not a word you necessarily want to hear on the water, but when you racing, it's a fact of life. At NYC we tend not to protest too often and try to resolve things as much as possible on the water, which is theoretically ideal, however after a time this tends to lead to people using the racing rules of sailing as a "rough guideline". In the recent few months there have been quite a few incidents that have highlighted the need to take things a bit more seriously. If someone infringes you and they don't do their penalty turns, please take it further. We as a club have the processes and procedures to cope with this but it's a rarely used resource. Remember the first step is mediation with experienced sailors who can clarify the rules. All sailors must and will be afforded respect throughout the process.

SAILING CO-ORDINATOR'S REPORT

Hello to Nedlands Members.

How quickly does the season fly by? We are closing in on the end of yet another season. Some of you will be tallying up your Championship and Consistency points to work out how close to the front of the fleet you are, while others like myself will lament how far back in the rankings we are (although I have been told that getting to the start line on time would help...).

Overall we have had a pretty good season with very few abandoned races, although very little in the way of variety – all SW breeze and either course 1 or 2 – none of those pesky Easterlies. We have been hovering just under 50 club boats per race and the Regatta committee are keen to build the number to better than 50 boats on water.

With a quick look backwards since the last Mainsheet we can see the second short course regatta and HMAS Perth regatta. There was much positive feedback to both regatta's during the debrief. The separation of fleets for the Short Course was well received and we plan to add a further mark to enhance the separation. HMAS was well attended by both Nedlands and visiting sailors. A total of 52 boats raced in excellent conditions. Next year will be the 60th regatta, and we hope to build on the number of competing boats.

Looking forward, planning is already underway for next season, with water space requests forwarded to Swan River Racing committee. The Regatta committee is hoping to get a couple of Winter dates up, so keep an eye on Traveller articles over the winter break.

The training courses have gone well again this season with 9 Tackers courses, 4 Start Sailing courses for Teenagers and Adults, and 2x Better Sailing on catamaran courses being run. The Tackers courses have feed into the Junior training fleet with a pleasing increase in the activity on the beach on a Sunday morning. The Adult courses have seen a number of the graduates stay on as crew in the club, but it would be great to see more. If you are looking for a crew or know someone that has held back from racing on a Sunday for lack of crew, the Start Sailing group is a great place to find willing and capable people to sail.

While on the subject of Training, our best marketing tool is word of mouth. If you know of anyone that is vaguely interested in learning to sail, then sing the praises of Nedlands and encourage them to come and try sailing at our great club. I am always happy to chat with potential new students or they can keep an eye on our web page for details.

Best of luck to those of you that have a chance of a podium finish for the season, as for the rest of us, I could think of many a worse thing to be doing on a Sunday afternoon.

Fees

The new financial year is fast approaching which means fees are due from 1^{st} May 2019. The fee discounts will work differently this year with a 5% discount to Senior Membership and Storage applicable from 1^{st} May -21^{st} May only. No discounts from 21^{st} May to 31^{st} July and then a 3% late payment fee added to the fees for Senior Sailing & Storage which accrue monthly from 1^{st} August until you become a financial member.

<u>Please note</u> We have recently discovered that non-financial members are **NOT** covered by Australia Sailing Insurance. To be covered for racing and on water, particularly over winter, you must be a financial member with the Club. If you are racing/sailing over Winter, please be mindful of this.

Security Reminder

Can we please ask that all members be mindful to make sure we lock gates behind us each time we go through them. I know it's painful, but with recent break ins we all will need to make conscious efforts to improve security.

The Management Committee are looking into Security measures as we plan for next financial year and will hopefully have an update in the near future.

Constitution Update

A Sub-Committee has been formed and tasked with the job of updating and refreshing our Constitution to represent a more modern society and reflect our current position.

A call for participation is extended to NYC members to submit suggestions you have for the constitution to constitution@nyc.org.au by 11th April. All submissions are required to be in writing to the email address provided.

An informal meeting will be called soon after this to allow for further discussions around the changes put forward to the constitution. This will then be taken to either the AGM in June 2019 or a Special GM if required.

Daz and Claire provided the story of the event. They came second in the Open despite being involved in about six collisions. One in particular was a brutal high speed collision with a tender that was being towed behind a huge power launch.

Incredibly the offending power launch was heading directly into a tightly packed grouping of about 30 racing Hobies. Its path was completely blocked yet it made no attempt to alter course. Then -after its smash with Daz and Claire it continued on without a pause — a classic hit and run. Peter Hancock was in a support boat and chased after it. He photographed it then called on the driver to stop. When asked, "Why did you do that?" the guy answered —and I quote - "What was I supposed to do?"

Anyhow now for the good bit... -After their brutal collision they raced back to the beach, hurriedly threw their rig and rudders onto one of Cam's spare boats, and then -without measuring a thing - returned to the start line for the next start just in time –well, just in time for the race that was delayed by a general recall. They came second in that race and won the next one. -The stuff of legend! ... A story like that could be embellished as the years go by...

In his speech at the States, Association President, Robin Dinsdale noted the following- The Association has over 50 members, the Cat Classic attracted 42 entrants, 9 WA teams attended the Nationals –the top 4 were all from WA-Cam & Suzzi, Gavin & Worstie, Daz & Claire and Phil & Caitlyn Epps. Sunday racing at NYC sees an average of nearly 20 Hobies each week. Robin noted that three or four of our teams will attend the Florida Worlds –with Cam & Suzzi also doing the Europeans. He advised that WA will be hosting the next Nationals at Jervoise Bay Yacht Club. He encouraged sailors to attend the winter series at Jervoise; He wants to promote the club and the Nationals and will soon ask us to support a drone video to be made down there.

Robin also mentioned that this season two groups have completed two training courses on Huey, Duey and Louie - our training boats at NYC;. Many sailors have thus been introduced to Hobies and to sailing and three of the course's graduates have become regular Hobie crews.

Esperance Bay Yacht Club has confirmed that it will host our States next year. It appears likely it will be held over Easter (not Labour Day Weekend as usual). Esperance is an incredibly beautiful place to sail; It is not too much to say that the opportunity to sail there is a chance of a lifetime; A regatta you will remember for the rest of your life. There are many wonderful places to visit in and around Esperance too so do consider extending your stay. Being Easter, accommodation will be at a premium; Book early.

During the autumn and winter months in Perth, sailing virtually comes to a standstill.

Many seek warmer climes by driving North or having a winter break in Bali. Here is

another inexpensive option: head to Poland where you can enjoy great sailing and, even for a family, not break the bank! A holiday flat (pensionat) on the lake for a couple, plus a new 25ft yacht, will only set you back around \$200 AUD a day during the peak season, depending on the exchange rate. Meals and drinks are cheap. So, what's it all about?

The main sailing area in Poland is the Masurian Lake District located in north-eastern Poland, about three to four hours by road from Warsaw or just over four hours by rail. We have now enjoyed two delightful week-long holidays in two of the most popular places, together with my wife, sister and brother-in-law.

June to August is the school and university holiday period and Masuria is a popular holiday destination for Poles, so book early. Due to family considerations we go during July, but it is less expensive in early June, and the locals told me that the sailing is better then, and also in August.

We book a pensionat on the lake front, with comfortable facilities, where the girls sleep. The boys sleep on the yacht, either moored out front, giving access to the pensionat facilities, or out on the lake edge nestled amongst the reeds on an overnight trip.

Our first trip in July 2016 saw us pick up the yacht up in Gizycko (Gizshko) and the sailing was on Lake Dargin.



most part we have experienced warm to hot days with light winds. As the wind strength can increase with little warning, the lake has a unique warning system consisting of tall poles with orange lights. These lights flash with increasing frequency to alert to increasing wind and the need to seek shelter. We experienced one squall of 35 knots with pouring rain.

The second trip was July 2018, where the pick up was from Prazmovo. We motored a couple of hours through the canals, under five bridges, to arrive at our pensionat base at Mikolajki. We then spent the week day sailing from Mikolajki on Lake Sniardwy, the largest lake. After visiting the marina at Popielno we sailed across the lake to Okarlowo, and then moored overnight in a sheltered bay.

Other sailors know the rules so sailing is enjoyable. For the

Our yacht of choice is the magnificent Phobos 25 built by Dalpol yachts and ours was brand spanking new! It has a standard layout: "V" double berth forward and a double under the cockpit. The head is an enclosed porta potty to port and the galley to starboard has a two-burner gas stove and a small top-loading fridge. The yacht is powered by an 8 HP four-stroke and comes with 12 litres of fuel. Cutlery and crockery are provided. All you need to bring is your own provisions, bedding and life jackets.

Know your Flags

Lots of info, so if you're in a rush you can just read the important bits in blue!

So, when I wrote my last article about buoy room, I had a few questions about "How do you know what the flags mean?" because face it, we all know our class flag and when to start, anything else and we kind of assume.

First of all we know that the start sequence is very important in a race, at 5 Minutes the class flag goes up, at 4 another flag pops up (which we call a preparatory flag), this one then goes down again at 1, followed by the class flag falling at start. But the preparatory flag is very important.

The main the preparatory flags used are P, I, Z or Black flag.



P Flag: Normal preparatory signal - A boat over the line at the start must keep clear of boats not returning, and can complete a Dip start, ie. If you cross the line too early, you just have to dip back through it before you can start again. If you fail to return through the line however you will be scored OCS (the 20% penalty rule)

Imagine the P flag is the top of the letter "P", and is a dip start.



I Flag: 30.1: If flag 'I' has been displayed, and any part of a boat's hull, crew or equipment is on the course side of the starting line during the last minute before her starting signal, she shall sail across to the pre-start side before starting – ie. If you cross the line within 1 minute of the start, you must go around an end before starting.

The 'I' flag looks like an eye... and is round in the middle, to remind you to round the ends.



Z Flag: 30.2: If flag Z has been displayed, no part of a boat shall be in the triangle formed by the ends of the starting line and the first mark during the last minute before her starting signal. If a boat breaks this rule and is identified, she shall receive, without a hearing, a 20% Scoring Penalty. She shall be penalized even if the race is restarted or resailed, but not if it is postponed or abandoned before the starting signal. – Basically, don't cross the line early or be between the line and the first mark.

The Z flag has lots of lines, just like the letter. And is dangerous, but if the race is restarted you are safe.



Black Flag: 30.4: If a black flag has been displayed, no part of a boat shall be in the triangle formed by the ends of the starting line and the first mark during the last minute before her starting signal. If a boat breaks this rule and is identified, she shall be disqualified without a hearing, even if the race is restarted or resailed. If a general recall is signalled or the race is abandoned and is restarted

or resailed she shall not sail in it. – Definitely don't be between the line and the first mark in the last minute of the starting sequence.

The black flag is black... and very dangerous...

Make sure you know which flag is up, because you may find yourself rounding the ends with no wind, and wasting valuable time when it was really a P flag. Or getting excited and crossing the line early when it was a Z or Black flag.


Other Flags to know:

If you cross the start line and a flag is raised, or a sound of the horn is heard, it may be a recall.



X Flag: 29.1; Individual recall

This means a boat (or more) has crossed the line early, and must come back and cross the line again to be counted as a race.




First Substitute: 29.2; General recall

This means all boats of the fleet must come back to the start line and the start sequence will start again, 1 minute after the flag is lowered.

If you think you crossed the line early it may be worth coming back to the line if the X Flag is raised, you may find the starter has raised the X flag when all boats crossed early except one, only that one will get points for the race.

Other Flags to know:





Answering Pennant (or AP): 32.1; Races not started are postponed.

The AP may be followed with a number flag underneath it to show how many hours' races will be postponed.









N Flag: 32.1; All races that have started are abandoned. Return to the starting area.

'N' means 'No More Racing'.

Both The AP and N flag can coincide with the A flag or the H flag:



A Flag: No more racing today

'A' means 'ALL racing is cancelled'



H Flag: Further signals ashore

'H' means 'go Home' (back to shore)



Eg. if N is over H, it means 'no more racing, go home'



the mark which the S flag is flying then proceed to Dalkeith Day Buoy if sailing course 1, 2, or 3, and Waratah Day Buoy if sailing course 4 then finish.

C Flag: 33; The position of the next mark has been changed

Usually used in ocean racing when bearings are crucial, or with Olympic classes.



L Flag: Ashore: A notice to competitors has been posted. Afloat: Come within hail or follow this vessel.



Y Flag: 40; Wear a personal flotation device Anybody on board any boat must wear a life jacket, PFD or buoyancy vest. Usually only flown when very strong or dangerous wind or weather conditions are present.



Blue flag: This race committee vessel is in position at the finishing line. Pretty much an on station flag for the finish line.



Orange Flag: or 'On Station Flag';

Meaning a start sequence will be made soon. All sighting of the start line are taken between this flag and the Pin end buoy. Rule 60 (RRS) and 8.2 (SI's) states that a boat shall not pass in either direction through a start of finish line in use, other than her own.

For more information on flags, read the Racing Rules of Sailing.
