REGATTA'S REPORT

Well, its Christmas time again. I wonder how many of you are like myself and trying our darndest to sneak across the line into the nice list before the big man visits. Some years I have to try pretty hard !!

The first half of the season has come and gone with lots of good memories and luckily very few hiccups. After lots of planning and discussion over winter about the Course 3's for each fleet, with the final statement of the Regatta committee being "It doesn't matter, as we rarely sail Course 3", saw the course sailed twice in the first couple of weeks. The weather seems to have progressed to the normal early summer pattern of light easterlies in the morning with a good strong Freo Doctor by the start sequence, so the Course 3 should be behind us for the season.

The training lacks a little lustre this year. We ran only one Tackers course in the October school holidays. The two Start Sailing courses in this half of the season have been small groups, although there are at about 6 participants from the two courses who regularly crew on Sundays – so that's a bonus. We have only run one Better Sailing course. I am hoping that the courses in the second half of the season pick up.

On the flip side, the Junior training is picking up. This is great to see, as the Juniors really are the future of our club.

The club is not hosting any regattas this summer break, so it will be quiet at Nedlands. Not so quiet at Jervoise Bay however with them hosting the Hobie Nationals. They are expecting a strong showing from the Nedlands members and we wish them all good sailing and gentle heads (after the inevitable evening events !!). We also wish our 125 sailors success at the Nationals in Port Lincoln over the Christmas break.

Summer Soul - a family thing

Summer Soul is a Redwitch, sailed by the Thewlis family. David, his wife, Jen and their two children Max and Zoe compete on championship days and place high up. This is their story ...

David was brought up in Asia and was around water all his childhood, however his first introduction to sailing was on an Outward Bound course in Hong Kong at the age of 10 where he was part of a crew on an old 120 ft. tea clipper that traversed the Hong Kong harbor under full sail with all the crew up the rigging. He really caught the sailing bug on moving to Dubai a couple of years later, where his father bought him a Laser and he would spend all his school holidays on the water. Being a bit of an adrenalin junky, it wasn't long before the thrill and speed of Prindle 16s (similar to a Hobie) took hold and he had moved on to racing these. During his time at Bristol University, he made friends with a fellow sailor whose family had a holiday home on the Isle of Wight and therefore summers were spent on the waters of the Solent, the highlight being Cowes week each year. Being young and believing he was invincible, this week was a blur of racing and evening merriment, where leaning over the windward rail on an upwind beat, staring into the churning waters and wondering why he had thought that a fifth shot of Jägermeister had been a good idea at 3am.

Meanwhile on the other side of the world, Jen had travelled to the US from Taiwan on a university exchange program. Whilst over there, she met a guy who invited her out sailing. The relationship blossomed and she ended up spending half a year working in Taiwan and half a year living aboard a 30 ft. yacht, cruising around



the West and East coasts for about three years. Luckily for David, she turned down a proposal of marriage returned to Taiwan where David would meet her many years later. Realising how rare it was to find a woman who loved sailing (especially in Taiwan), David proposed to Jen in 2009 and a promise was made that he would buy Jen a boat in lieu of a diamond ring as she saw no use in a fancy rock on her finger. They then set about deciding where in the world they would like to live, narrowing down their choices to places with great sailing conditions - San Diego, Barcelona and Fremantle. Due to a number of other factors. Fremantle became their preferred choice and they moved here in 2010.

Keen to sail, Jen was curious how they were going to meet someone with a boat on which they could crew. She was surprised to hear from David that it would be as simple as contacting local sailing clubs and asking. After a brief phone call, they found themselves aboard *Cover Drive*, a Cole 32 based at South of Perth Yacht

Club. It was on this boat, with Peter Were as skipper and a very experienced crew that David and Jen really honed their racing skills around the Swan River and the boat won both the Championship and Consistency titles during numerous sailing seasons. David's work took them away from the water and sailing in 2015, however on their return to the Perth region it was time for David to fulfil the promise that he had made all those years earlier.

Warlock was looking a bit rough, but she had been used for racing by James McQuie at Nedlands Yacht Club, so all the basics were there. David bought the boat at the beginning of 2018, but as they had returned to crewing on **Cover Drive**, it was used for day sailing with the children. During the winter of 2018, the boat was towed up to their property in Toodyay and David and Jen worked on it for several months, stripping the boat down, sanding and repainting it both inside and out. They asked the children what colour it should be and Max told them, "Red because it goes faster." They also felt that, although they understood the current name, traditionally boats have a more feminine name. Therefore on returning the boat to Nedlands in the spring, they underwent a renaming ceremony at the jetty, offering rum to Neptune for fair winds and good fortune, and **Summer Soul** was launched.

A new main had been purchased and Dave and Jen decided that they would start to compete in more races that season. However, there must have been a shortage in the rum offerings to Neptune, as in their third race of the season, their mast snapped at the spreaders. This was almost the end of *Summer Soul* as the cost of a new mast was going to mean that the insurance company would write her off. David felt it would be a shame to see her go after all the time and effort they had put into her and launched a plan to buy her back as repairable write off, but they needed a mast. David posted on Sea Breeze asking if anyone had a second hand mast for a Red Witch only to be answered by a fellow member at Nedlands Yacht Club, Mark Christie who sails on *Forcera*. He had another mast available and a deal was struck, but it wasn't until mid-February that they were back on the water. With the extra cash from the insurance pay out, they invested in new genoas (#1 and #2) and looked to compete in the coming 2019/2020 season.

David says that although they would love to sail every weekend, they want to find the right balance for the children. Max is quickly learning to become a navigator and releases the sheets on the tacks, whilst Zoe prefers to sit behind the tiller keeping an eye out for boats on starboard before gently nodding off to sleep usually by the second upwind leg. They have decided to try and compete in only the Championship races this year and continue to spend some time having family days out over the summer holidays, so that Max and Zoe fall in love with sailing as their parents have done. They love being part of Nedlands Yacht Club and, in particular, the fact that it comes across as a more relaxed and family friendly club than many other clubs on the river.

A great tip, from Stella


Stella, is my beautiful Holland 25. She has a Yanmar 2GM20 inboard diesel engine. This engine is fairly simple and is raw water cooled. This means that raw seawater is drawn in and circulated around the engine for cooling and blown out via the exhaust system. This works very well but does mean that, unless sacrificial anodes (zinc) are used, electrolytic action will occur which will swiftly cause corrosion.

My engine has two anodes – one in the cylinder head and one in the engine block. Both need to be checked and replaced as they constantly erode. I had never done this but reading the workshop manual it did not appear to be too difficult. The anodes are each set in the end of a large bolt which protrudes into the cylinder head or engine block. This bolt is so large that I had to buy a spanner much larger than any I owned. These bolts obviously live in a very hostile environment - hot salt water. This seems to corrode slightly the threads to such an extent that even with my new super spanner I simply could not move them. I tried all the usual remedies CRC, Heat, Brute force, penetrating oil etc. Nothing worked and I was worried about shearing the bolts.

I came across a product called "Freeze and Release" produced by Loctite which is supposed to work by freezing the component on which it is sprayed to -40 degrees and thereby shrink everything and break whatever seal has existed. As I know everyone will remember from school days -40 degrees is the same in C or F. (If you don't believe me just do the sums but remember that -40 -32 = -72). It worked perfectly and has now been used on various rusted or corroded components. From memory it was approx. \$10.00. Needless to say I have no financial interest in Loctite.

I remember the last day being cancelled in South Australia years ago - On the second last day our WA team looked set to clean up –Six of us were in the top ten; We were kings in those days even with huge fleets and greats including Ian "Basho" Bashford, Rod Waterhouse, Geoff Metcalf and Kerli Corlett in attendance. Phil Smyth would surely win; the great Mal McKercher would come second etc. but suddenly the last day didn't happen –cancelled. The guy that happened to be in the lead on points at the end of the second last day was a little known sailor from NSW. He was declared the winner –anticlimax... He never won anything

of note again. But sailing is a points thing – and that can happen. Like the true champion he is Phil was a gentleman about it. And yet 40 years later he still remembers every detail about that outcome. It doesn't matter? Actually ... it matters a lot.

A lesson to be learned from both that series and the recent Worlds is the need to get in as many races as possible early in the series – Well BEFORE the last day – so the last day largely only confirms the sailors rankings.

You may well ask what a Queenslander is doing in a photo of the team I'm calling Team WA; — Well in fact Worstie grew up in WA so I guess we can claim him as one of our own (at least when he's sober).
