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## COMMODORES REPORT

Welcome to the Spring Mainsheet and my first as Commodore of the club. The winter period is usually a little quieter for NYC, however during this winter the club has actually been in a hype of activity starting with the Australian School Team Racing in July which saw close to 200 races completed and almost 120 kg of chips consumed by competitors over the 4-day event. Nedlands received fantastic feedback as the hosts of the event and I would like to thanks Graeme, Alison and Jacinta for all of their work in behind the scenes as well as Karen and Lisa along with their band of volunteers in the Galley which included many of our Junior members. I also had the pleasure of handing out the awards at the presentation ceremony where Nedlands was congratulated many times for being great a club and venue to hold the teams racing event. We hope to be involved again next year as the host club for the WA state titles and we are also using this opportunity to attract more Schools and Junior to train out of Nedlands over the coming season.

During the Winter, we also held our AGM, where we elected our new Patron of the Club and I would like to congratulate Barry Court on being elected Nedlands Newest Patron and continuing the long association of the Court Family with NYC. I would also like to thanks Richard Court for his long-standing patronage of the Club and look forward to Richard still being involved with NYC.

We also had a number of new members join the Club over Winter and I would like to welcome them to the club. It has also been great to see many of the new members along with our older members attend our recent Busy Bees and contributing to the maintenance and ongoing improvements to the club.

The Management Committee has also been working hard on maintaining our strong balance sheet and also budgeting for some significant improvements over the next 12 months. This year we will be installing a 15KW solar system on the main clubhouse roof which will immediately reduce our power costs. We have also budgeted for the refurbishment of the Beach Ramp to improve launching of our coach boats and provide an overflow for the trailer sailors and trimarans when the main ramp gets busy and we have also invested in a new Coach Boat that will assist in our delivery of our increasingly popular adult and junior training courses as well as our new Hobie Training course which we will launch in September for commencement in October.

This year the Management Committee will also refresh and update our 5 Year Strategic Plan which will assist in guiding many of our decisions going forward and I look forward to receiving input from our members and fleets on how we can continue to grow our membership and provide great facilities for all or our members.

At the time of writing our Managing Secretary is also recuperating after knee surgery and we wish Alison a swift and successful recovery and look forward to seeing her back at the club late September in preparation for Opening Day. During this period please contact Jacinta for all or your enquiries.

Our Opening Day is Sunday 1 October however we will kick off the season with our Try Sailing Day on Saturday 23 September, which is combined with the Cat Classic. These are both great events so please look out for the promotional material and get down to the club to support.

## REGATTA REPORT

Although the rain has been rolling in and on, there has been plenty going on in the background to make the coming season a success.

After much time consuming and dedicated research from Ron Stokes, Don Mullaley, Gavin Taylor and Greg Hill the new ramp will be installed in the next few months. The idea was pretty simple, an alternative way into the water for the trailable cruiser fleet on Sundays. The design and implementation process has been about as simple as solving a rubiks cube. However, we are close, with approvals obtained from local and state government entities involved for the first stage. The positive is that this problem of access to the water has come about because there are so many boats trying to get into the water for Sunday racing. The emerging trimaran fleet should be well served by this alternative route. This will also be great for launching the training support boats and generally take pressure off the main ramp. The early part of the season should at least see stage one of this project completed.

The support / training boat fleet has been bolstered this season by the acquisition of a Whaly 4.3. It is a plastic boat that we very much hope it will be indestructible and around in 20 years' time. This will eventually replace the inflatable ribs we currently have while providing us some extra capacity this season with our extra training program.

In the coming season, we will be running Tackers training (Optimist), Start Sailing (Pacer), Sunday Advanced Dinghy coaching (Flying 11) and for the first time Catamaran Training Courses (Hobie 16).

The club has acquired three Hobie 16 's over winter which are in various states of readiness. The club has been very lucky in being able to get these boats for a very small outlay. Thanks go to Shane Vernon, in particular, for providing his old boat to the club on very generous terms. A lot of work has been done to get these boats up to speed to make them safe training boats. A big thank you to the Hobie section members who have helped out so far. The catamaran course will hopefully provide a pathway for sailors who have already done "start sailing one" on the Pacers and a direct entry path for people with some sailing experience into Hobie 16's for Sunday Sailing.

Racing this season will kick off with the Catamaran Classic on the $24^{\text {th }} \& 25^{\text {th }}$ Sept, run by the Hobie Association and hosted by NYC. The club opening day is on the $1^{\text {st }}$ October. The trimaran/catamaran cruisers fleet is to set to grow and the 125 fleet looks set to make a comeback this season with several of the junior/training fleet members having acquired a 125 and are set to join the racing fleet which is great.

The club, as we all know, runs largely on volunteers. We are intending to conduct an Officer of the Day training in the near future. In the last several years we have leaned heavily on several past commodores to run the racing Sundays and we thank them very sincerely. However, we need to extend the number of members qualified to run a Sunday racing day so it can be less onerous on the few. It's a good opportunity for a new generation to step up into these types of roles and realise the effort required behind the scenes to bring together a successful Sunday.

I look forward to seeing you all on the start line on Opening Day.

## FINANCIAL MATTERS

Our current cash position while healthy at this stage of $\$ 370,000$ does face some large capital outlays all of which will add to the overall assets of the club and in the instance of the solar panels reduce our recurrent expenditure on power. This year's budget (May 2017 to April 2018) has included a provision for the installation of solar panels to the roof of the clubhouse. The committee also agreed to allocating $\$ 20,000$ for this financial year to the second launching ramp. The growth in our small cruiser fleet, especially in the multihull group has put increased pressure on the main ramp. Money has also been put aside for the verandah roof to improve its appearance and lengthen its life by dealing with the increased rust. This is also a requirement by the council in accordance with our lease and duty to maintain the building. It is also important from an aesthetic point of view.

Our income is slightly down for the first quarter compared to last year by $\$ 12,500$ due in the main to lower than normal functions revenue. Our membership and storage income is marginally higher and the overall profit to date of $\$ 23,500$ is $\$ 20,000$ more than the first quarter of last financial year. This is mostly due to the major capital projects not yet coming into account.

Teams racing was very successful and also allowed for a revenue boost but took a considerable amount of our staff time.

We have changed our insurance broker to Nexus and they are undertaking a comprehensive revaluation of our financial risks something that is long overdue in view of our increased exposure through changes in our assets and in the business side of the club.

For the information of members, I have included 2 pie charts showing where our revenue comes from and where it is spent.


It is important to note that the club now has a large recurrent expenditure. For the Summer Mainsheet, I will produce a breakdown of our expenditure to give members an idea of where our financial resources go in terms of maintenance, capital improvement and recurrent costs.

You can also use the program for yourself and receive crime trends for the area that you live in.
To access this useful resource what you need to do is:

1. Go to https://www.ewatch.com.au/
2. Register by Clicking "Join" at the top of the screen.
3. Fill in your details on the form

Once this is done, you will be able to select an area relevant to you and from then on you can either go online to see what the current crime trends are and other information, or just simply receive the updates via email from your Local Policing team and or Water Police and disseminate to members.

## CRUISER SECTION

## New ramp and jetty

Whilst the club has been on hiatus during the winter with not much boating activity underway, plenty has been happening on shore. Ron Stokes and a number of club stalwarts have been particularly busy and should be commended for their efforts in progressing plans for a second launching ramp to be built to the South of the NYC jetty. The process of designing the structures, obtaining quotes, seeking approval from the various authorities and getting engineering overview has taken in excess of 500 hours from these volunteers.

Construction will start in September and will be completed in three phases. The first phase will see the first part of the ramp laid and compressed limestone access roads put in place. The second and third phase (once approved and funded) will see the ramp extended and a floating jetty installed.

## 2B or Not 2B

It's not a question. Cruiser Division 2 will now be made up of a Single hull division 2A and a multihull division 2B. This will allow for competitive racing amongst the two very different types of boats without recourse to massive handicaps. With up to 15 multihulls scheduled to be on the water this season it certainly makes sense.

Given the extra numbers of multihulls on the water and the extra width of these boats (the widest being 6 meters wide) the start line may need to be lengthened to 75 meters to lessen the risk of collisions. Refer to sailing instructions closer to the start of the season.

## Sail Numbers

All boats sailing in all NYC Cruiser divisions are reminded that they need to display an N number on your mainsail.

There were 5 girl's schools that competed and had a final series for themselves, with The Friends School Tassie beating out Ascham college.

The team Cam Owen / Susan Ghent sailed impressively in all conditions, won half of the races and the victory was celebrated on Sunday at the prize giving in a full tent of visitors and their competitors. In the second place, the reigning world champion of Hobie 16 Daniel Bjørnholt-Christensen with his brother Nicolaj landed in front of Ingo Delius / Sabine Delius-Wenig from Germany. Only the better individual results of the young Danes separated silver and bronze.


At the end of the Hobie World Cat, the weather at the Brandenburg beach in Westerland on Sylt provided a bit of everything. 15 knots from West Northwest, incoming tide and a wonderful light were the best memories. Even before the last day it was clear that it would be very difficult to beat the leading and very confident Australians, but the organizers wanted to sail more races on Sunday. However, the Australians did not let anything affect them and won the first two races on Sunday. In the third and last race, they then settled down in the high waves and passed the victory of the last race to South Africa. After 15 races, there was a clear 10-point lead for Australia."
